

North Lincolnshire Museum's Sensory Map transcription

Welcome to an audio description of North Lincolnshire Museum's Sensory Map. It is designed to help you identify possible sensory triggers within the Museum.

The entrance to North Lincolnshire Museum is located on the Ground Floor through an automatic glass door. There is seating to the left as you enter. To the right, there is the skeleton of the Winterton Lady and male, female and accessible toilets. A member of staff will greet you. There is an interactive screen where you can access the Museum website. There is a lift to the first floor in front of you, and a staircase to the right. The Reception area also includes a Shop and is bright with natural light.

The first gallery is called Jurassic Sea. There is an automatic door to the Courtyard on the right. You will find a digital interactive projected onto the floor. This makes sounds too.

As you enter the Steel Town gallery, you will find a low-level interactive on the left and a TV screen with seating on the right. As you follow this around the corner, you will find another screen. Both of these make sounds.

Ahead is Dudley's Den. This is a space for Under 5s. It is bright with natural light and is accessed using automatic glass doors.

Beyond Steel Town is the Ironstone Cottage. There is a step down from cottage entrance to the kitchen area. In this room, there are a lot of objects you can handle.

The next gallery is Local History. This is not a bright space and there are many tall exhibition cases.

The People's War Gallery follows on and is an open space. You can walk inside an Anderson Shelter. This is a dark space, and sounds are triggered as you enter. The room also includes an interactive which creates a loud, siren sound. In this gallery, you will also find a listening station, seating and a digital, interactive screen.

The final gallery on the Ground Floor is the Post-War Gallery. There is an interactive by the Fire Exit which can make a loud banging sound. There is also a TV and record player in our living room display area, both of which make sounds. Here, you will find our second set of stairs.

On the first floor, there is seating at the top of the front set of stairs. Please see our up-to-date map or ask our staff for details of potential triggers in our Main Gallery. This space changes twice a year.

The Archaeology Gallery has a step at both entrance points. A level access ramp is available. If you are using the lift to access the First Floor, travel through the Main Gallery and you will find the ramp ahead and on the right.

As you enter the Archaeology Gallery by the stairs, you will find a complete human skeleton on display. On the right-hand side, there is a low-level child's interactive

station. As you follow the route to the left, there is a digital interactive which makes a sound. Towards the exit point, there is a speaker which plays Medieval music.
